Abstract

This genealogical tutorial is a reference guide for the Research Room. It highlights where to locate key research online and through other archival repositories. The sites in this tutorial contain free websites. Many of the sites referenced are used in the Research Room through the 'Online Resources' Homepage.

This tutorial includes information on State Census, finding graves, locating cemetery information, locating historical newspapers, information on land records, wills, and adoptions. A summary of contacts of other repositories in the Southeast Region has also been included.

In addition, example articles are included in each section. These articles are from the Family Search Learn Center and the Ancestry Learn Center. These are additional resources that are extremely helpful in locating other resources in the genealogical research journey. As well, Ancestry and Family Search also have presentations that give practical advice for the beginning genealogist.

State Census

1. Alabama State Census

- a. Ancestry has the state census from 1820-1866.
 - i.Only four are in the database.
 - ii..1820, 1850, 1855, and 1866 are the only censuses with 1866 covering the most counties.
 - iii.No mention of slave schedules attached. However, they do indicate whether a person is free or a slave.
- b. The Alabama Department of Archives and History also has these censuses.
 i.The 1855 is the only census that has a partial index.
 - ii.What the census tells
 - 1. 1820: The census will provide the name of the head of the household for free white males and females in age categories, the number of slaves, and the number of free persons of color in age categories.
 - 1850: This census identifies the same information as the 1820 Census.
 - 3. 1855: The same information as the 1820 and 1850.
 - 4. 1860: The only difference with this census is that it lists the head of African-American households.
- c. FamilySearch.org -- Has the 1855 and 1860 State Census
- d. The information on the State Census from the Alabama Department of Archives and History is located on the following site: http://www.archives.state.al.us/referenc/census.html
- e. New Horizons Genealogy has these census lists on their site. The site is free. i.The website is the

- ii.Along with the State Census, the site lists the Census of Pensioners taken in 1840. It lists the person receiving the pension as well as whom they are residing with and in what county.
- f. Census-Online (<u>www.census-online.com</u>) -- This site is free. It contains access to State and Federal Census on-line. The following link is for the state of Alabama. A map will come up with the counties and census options on the sidebar. You have to click either the county or the census to see what census information is available. 2. Florida State Census

- a. FamilySearch.org has the 1885, 1935, and 1945 State Census
- b. Ancestry has the following databases: Florida State Census 1867-1945, Florida, State Census, 1885, Florida Census, 1820-90, Census Records and Cherokee muster rolls.
- c. Census-Finder at <u>http://www.censusfinder.com/florida.htm</u> has the same information as Ancestry. In addition, this site includes a 1783 Spanish Census Records of East Florida.

d. Florida Department of State: Division of Library and Information Services at http://dlis.dos.state.fl.us/index_Researchers.cfm has the 1185, 1935, and 1945 state census on microfilm. They also have various Native American censuses as well.

3. Georgia State Census

- a. Georgia State Census from 1820 to 1930 is located at the Atlanta History Center.
- b. A Georgia State Census Index is available for the years of 1820-1870 at the GA Archives. The web link to access these indexes as well as finding Federal Census is the following: http://sos.georgia.gov/archives/what_do_we_have/census_records/using_the_f_ederal_census.htm
- c. Ancestry has the Georgia Census from 1790-1890 as a database.
- d. Slave schedules were performed on the 1850 and 1860 GA State Census on Ancestry.
- e. Familysearch.org does not have the GA State Census.

4. Kentucky State Census

- a. Familysearch.org does not have the State Census.
- b. Ancestry has the 2nd census of KY 1800, Kentucky Census, Reconstructed, 1790 -- KY was a part of Virginia at the time of the census. This census is a reconstruction of what KY would have looked like if it had been an official state.
- c. Kentucky State ate Archives and Libraries
 (<u>http://statearchives.us/kentucky.htm</u>) --This site is a great tool for
 genealogists searching for Kentucky ancestors especially using the Census.

5. Mississippi State Census

- a. Ancestry does have the MS State and Territorial Census Collection from 1792-1866. Census Records and Cherokee Muster Rolls are also included.
- b. Familysearch.org has the following: Mississippi, State Archives, Various Records, 1820-1951 -- former slave narratives, land records, military veterans, military grave registration, and naturalization records. Archives located in Jackson. MS, Enumeration of Educable Children, 1850-1892; 1908-1957 contains school records of children.

6. North Carolina Sate Census

- a. Ancestry has a database for the North Carolina State Census from 1784-1787.
- b. FamilySearch.org does not have the state census.
- c. CensusFinder.com has the 1793-1840 Black Craftsmen of North Carolina, 1835 Pension Roll, and 1838 Indian Removal -- North Carolina Regiment
- d. State Archives of North Carolina <u>www.archives.ncdcr.gov</u> -- The Archives has the 178401787 State Census on microfilm, and it is also available in book form in the Archives and the State Library genealogy room.

7. South Carolina State Census

- a. Ancestry does not have a database for state censuses that I could find.
- b. Census-Online.com -- I found three different State Census i.1843 Census for Anderson County
 - ii.1847 Census of Catawba Native Americans in York County
 - iii.1854 Census of Catawba Native Americans in York County
- c. Familysearch.org does not have a state Census.
- d. South Carolina Department of Archives and History -- <u>http://scdah.sc.gov/Pages/default.aspx</u> -- The Archives has scattered State Census records for the years of 1829, 1839, 1869, and 1875. Some of the records are on microfilm.
- e. Census Finder at <u>www.censusfinder.com/south_carolina.htm</u> -- A free site that has a link to the following Census Records: 1716-1783 Early Colonists of South Carolina Census, 1770 Tyron County NC, -- has early SC settlers included, 1779 Census of the 96th District, and 1781 Residents of Unknown Counties of South Carolina

8. Tennessee State Census

- a. Ancestry has TN Census 1810-1891, TN Enumeration of Male Voters for 1891, and the 1770-1790 Census of Cumberland Settlements.
- b. FamilySearch.org does not have State Census databases.
- c. Tennessee State Library and Archives has the following materials on State Censuses.
 - i. Lainhart, Ann S. (1992). *State census records*. Baltimore, MD: Genealogical Publishing.
 - ii. The archives has available on microfilm the 1890 census for Veterans. The 1890 census was destroyed in a fire in Washington D.C.
 - iii. The archives has the school censuses from 1946 to 1968. They vary in completeness from county to county. The following link gives detailed information on this census and the information that the Archives has. www.tn.gov/tsla/history/county/school.htm
 - iv. The 1800 Census for Tennessee was lost. The territorial census of Tennessee was lost. The 1810 census of Tennessee was almost completely destroyed except for Grainger and Rutherford County. Most records of counties of the 1820 census in east Tennessee were lost.

v. The only state census that they have is the 1891 enumeration of male voters in Tennessee. All this census recorded were the names of the men, the county or residence, and sometimes the age and race. This census is also available through Ancestry.

I. General Sites for Every State

- a. *BillionGraves Index* can be accessed from FamilySearch.org under the 'All Records Collection'. Family Search provides the birth, death, burial place, marital status, and picture if available.
- b. *Find A Grave*
 - i. www.findagrave.com
 - ii. Provides pictures and descriptions of tombstones located around the world.
- c. Commonwealth War Graves Commission
 - i. <u>www.cwgc.org</u> -- This site is free.
 - ii. This site has records of the men who are buried at cemeteries during the years of the First and Second World War
 - iii. They care for cemeteries and memorials in 153 countries. This is great for people looking for those who served in the military and may have loved ones buried in other countries.
 - iv. The organizations maintain these cemeteries and memorials as well as preserve the records of the fallen.
- d. Cemetery and Tombstone Transcription and Burial Registrar
 - i. <u>http://www3.sympatico.ca/bkinnon/cemeteries.htm</u> This site is free. It covers all United States. It includes links to Internment.net and lists counties with records from certain cemeteries
 - ii. This site provides cemeteries in Canada and the U.S. Scroll down the Homepage and you will see the U.S. category with the states as subcategories. Click on any state that patron requests.
- e. Ancestry has a database entitled 'Abstract of Graves of Revolutionary Patriots'.

II. Alabama Cemeteries

- a. Ancestry.com The Cemetery Record Compendium This database is a directory of cemetery records and where they are located.
- b. Alabama, Deaths and Burials Index, 1881-1974 in Ancestry Indicates the death date as well as the burial place.
- c. Ancestry also has a database called Alabama cemetery records. This is an index of records. It will produce the record with birth and death date. You have to go to the first page of where the index starts to locate the county.
- d. Web: Alabama, Find A Grave Index, 1817-1974 is also included in Ancestry.
- e. In Ancestry, go under 'Search All Records', and click on 'View All Records'. If you type 'Alabama cemetery records' as a search term, you will get cemetery records for different counties on page four such as Cemetery records of Jefferson and Walker Counties, Alabama.

III. Florida Cemeteries

- a. Florida, Jacksonville Area Obituary Collection, 1851-2009 located in Ancestry may be of use to finding where they are buried.
- b. FamilySearch.org has a database entitled Florida, Deaths and Burials, 1900-1921 contains the death and burial records for the state of Florida. Microfilm copies are available at the Family History Library and Family History Centers.
- c. The Florida State Archives has the following information on cemeteries.

- i. A burial listing of Florida's military veterans.
- Cemetery records, 1835-1989 on microfilm. The microfilmed copies contain internment and burial records from city cemeteries in Tallahassee.
- iii. Copies of mortician ledgers and cemetery records, 1835-1932. These are records from Florida State Hospital.

- b. *African American Cemeteries* at <u>www.africanamericancemeteries.com/ky/</u> has a few counties and cemeteries to browse through. Kentucky has only seven cemeteries listed.
- c. *The Kentucky Department for Libraries and Archives* provides access in their catalog where cemeteries can be found. They are not available on-line. Many of them are found through other agencies. Contact information is listed if applicable.
 - i. Cemetery removal permits from 1939 to 1973 -- These permits were used to relocate individual graves or cemeteries due to road or dam construction. Information on the permits include the name of deceased, death date, present gravesite, new gravesite and facility or person responsible moving the grave.

- ii. Cemetery records, [ca. 1830] -1993 –These records are located at the Marion County Public Library [201 East Main St., Lebanon, KY 30033, USA] - These records include burials in Catholic cemeteries in Marion, Nelson, Washington, and Meade Counties. Cemeteries from the following churches are included: Holy Marys, St. Charles, St. Augustine, St. Francis of Assisi, and Holy Cross in Marion County; St. Catherine, and St. Thomas in Nelson County; St. Rose in Washington County; and Old St. Theresa's in Meade County. Detailed listings from St. Charles Boromeo in Louisville, and information on the Lebanon National Cemetery in Marion Marion County. Information includes birth and death dates. Often, parents' names, mother's maiden name, birthplace, where the individual died, spouse, and wife's maiden name are sometimes included. - iii. Grave registration forms and cards The Works Progress Administration began to register the graves of Kentucky veterans. Veterans from the Revolutionary War through World War I are included. Surveyors included information from most of Kentucky's 120 counties. The collection is located at the Kentucky Department of Military Affairs, Military Records and Research Library, 1121 Louisville Road, Frankfort, KY 40601 USA. The condition of material has acid damage and dirt. Only 39 counties were transcribed on data cards and the rest of the collection is on survey sheets. These records are available on microfilm. They recorded name, birth and death dates, war, branch of service, enlistment and discharge date, cemetery name location of grave and source of information (headstone and/or relative is recorded.
